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Accessing skeletal collections for research: advice and guidance

This document focuses on skeletal collections held by museums and archives (hereafter, termed institutions) in the United Kingdom (UK). However, where collections are held by universities or other responsible bodies (e.g. commercial field units) this document will be relevant.

Institutions are funded and staffed in a variety of ways and will have different priorities, routes and criteria for granting access to their collections. They are not required to provide access in every case and may have limitations on when a collection can be viewed. With this in mind, you should always leave sufficient time (i.e. at least two months) to request a research visit and supply any supporting information needed.

You need to have a good idea about which site/collection you want to access before you contact the institution. Whilst institutions are usually happy to help, they are usually limited by staff time and costs, and this will impact on how much they can help you. Collections which fit your research aims can be identified using local Historic Environment Records (HERs, formally SMRs), publications and grey literature. Commercially produced site reports usually state where the site archive will be deposited. With respect to archaeological material, institutions usually cover a prescribed geographical collecting area. If you have identified a site but have been unable to find out where it was deposited, the Archaeological Data Service (ADS) hosts an interactive map compiled by the Society of Museum Archaeologists which identifies the collecting areas of different museums and archives. Bear in mind that this map only shows current collecting areas, and sites excavated a long time ago may not have ended up at the most obvious institution (e.g. the Natural History Museum and The British Museum curate Iron Age and Roman human remains from Yorkshire). The institution currently covering the area is still a good place to contact in the first instance, as they will most likely know which institutions are relevant to your search.

Check the institution's website thoroughly; some institutions have some or all of their archives listed online. If you find the right archive online, see if the institution has a formalised application process and if they do, follow it to the letter, and make sure you provide all the relevant information. If the institution does not have an online catalogue, they will usually have a central enquiries route (often via email) which you can follow. If in doubt about where you need to send your enquiry, call the institution to find out who you should contact.

At this initial stage, you should provide as much useful information as possible for the institution to answer your enquiry. Always include your name, position, research project and interest in the collection, but be brief – you can always provide more detail at a later date. Not all institutions catalogue their archives in the same way, and older archives contain different information to recently excavated sites. At a minimum include the following:

- Site name
- Site location (include the grid reference if known)

- Site code
- Date of excavation
- Excavator name (especially useful for older excavations)
- Period of the site

It can also be useful to include the monument number assigned to the excavation by the HER, but this is not always carried across to the institution, and its use will vary between counties and countries in the UK.

Wait a reasonable amount of time for a response (e.g. two weeks); keep in mind that institutions with collections which are accessed frequently, are dealing with many enquiries and staff may be engaged with other projects. Conversely, institutions with fewer enquiries may have less staff responsible for many different collections.

The institution should be able to tell you if they hold that site, or will be able to suggest an alternative institution. If they are unable to answer your enquiry or grant access at the current time, they should inform you of this. If the institution has the archive you are looking for and can support research access, it is reasonable for supporting documentation to be requested prior to access being granted. Institutions may have blanket rules covering access (e.g. undergraduate research vs PhD research). These policies will have been created by the institute to safeguard their collections and make appropriate use of staff time, and should be respected.

Institutions who can offer research access may have a limited timescale for doing so, for example, one day a week or not during certain periods. Staff may be able to make arrangements for researchers coming a significant distance and there is no harm requesting an alternative arrangement, but the rules are usually created in response to staffing levels and commitments, and space limitations, so there are no guarantees.

Collections are held by institutions so that research can be carried out and prior assumptions revisited. Researchers play an important role in this work and institutions will try hard to offer a good service. However, please bear in mind that institutions are generally busy and understaffed, and providing access to collections is only one aspect of their role. It may not be possible for your specific request to be given priority in an organisation which has numerous other areas to oversee, many of which are managed by the same individual or small team. Making an enquiry which is polite, straight-forward and demonstrates that you have done your own back-ground research makes it easier to answer, and is more likely to result in a positive outcome.

Contact information for the Historic Environment Record (HER) offices and where relevant, museum services in the United Kingdom

The <u>Historic Environment Record</u> (formerly known as the Sites and Monuments Records, SMRs) is a resource which archives all of the information about archaeological sites and finds, historical buildings and landscapes for a given area.

Note that the linked page provides the local authority areas covered by the HER, online record access information, location, opening hours, facilities, summary of available information and contact information for staff. The relevant museum service for each county, area or country is also provided; please note that due to funding cuts, some museums have stopped accepting archives (http://www.socmusarch.org.uk/docs/Archaeological-archives-and-museums-2012.pdf).

Information has been provided by country at county/region level, which where possible, also includes metropolitan counties.

Archaeological contractors

Commercial archaeological contractors play an important role in holding cemetery populations they have excavated until they can be deposited with an institution. Curation is not, however, their primary role and although they will often assist (particularly where research may be of benefit to the archaeological project), they are under no obligation to provide access or deal with research enquiries. They are businesses whose work is often governed by client-confidentiality agreements, which may mean that samples **are not** available for access - often for many years - until they have been fully recorded and/or deposited with a curating institution.

Contact information for commercial archaeological contractors operating in the United Kingdom, and who are professionally registered, is provided by the <u>Chartered Institute for Archaeologists</u>. They also provide links to contractors working in Europe and elsewhere in the world.

Other institutions

The majority of holdings are curated by museums and institutions funded by the Department for Culture, Media and Sport or the Arts Council for England, such as the Natural History Museum, The British Museum, Museum of London and Historic England. These institutions provide information about the human remains in their care.

Increasingly, a large number of archaeologically derived human remains are held by non-Governmental institutions. These include independent museums (those not funded by the Government whether at local or national level), universities, medical and dental schools and museums. Many of these institutions provide online information about their holdings; for example, The Hunterian Museum, Royal College of Surgeons (London).

Advice about accessing collections

In England, <u>Dr Simon Mays (Historic England)</u> may be able to assist with enquiries, and the Government bodies <u>Historic Environment Scotland</u>, <u>Cadw</u> (Wales) and the <u>Department of Culture</u>, <u>Arts and Leisure</u> (Northern Ireland) may also be able to help with an enquiry.

The Human Remains Subject Specialist Network can also be contacted, as their members represent museums and institutions across the UK.

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
